

KTWU Television, through its local destinations for unique content, strives to be an innovative, multi-media leader that entertains, educates and presents diverse perspectives that serve the local community.



KTWU turned 57 on Oct. 21, 2022, after preceding the arrival of the **Public Broadcasting Service**, **PBS**, by five years. Operations were robust in FY23, with many more in-person events than the previous year. Guests on our local shows participated in the studio and remotely with ZOOM, which allowed us to expand guest opportunities!

COMMUNITY EVENTS


KTWU conducted a community outreach project about the **Underground Railroad** that included a community event held at a stop on the Underground Railroad; the premiere of a special **!nspire** episode, **"Underground Railroad"**, and backto-back encore presentations of two PBS documentaries: **"Harriet Tubman: Visions of Freedom"** and **"Becoming Frederick Douglass"**.

The **community event** was held in partnership with the Shawnee County Historical Society, the Topeka Shawnee County Public Library and the Washburn University[®] Department of History.

The public was invited to the Historic Ritchie House, a stop on the Underground Railroad from 1857 to 1861 and one of at least eight safe houses in Topeka during the Bleeding Kansas area, to:

- Attend a presentation about the role northeast Kansas played in the Underground Railroad
- View previews of PBS documentaries **"Harriet Tubman:** Visions of Freedom" and **"Becoming Frederick Douglass**"
- Listen to panel discussion about the Underground Railroad in Kansas and ask questions

Attendees were given guided tours of The Historic Ritchie House in groups while Topeka native and classically trained dancer J'Shawn Gill performed a piece called "Dripping", with song "Berceuse", by Alexandra Streliski.







KTWU began offering programming from **FIRST NATIONS EXPERIENCE (FNX)** on November 1, 2022, during Native American Heritage Month. First Nations Experience is the first and only national broadcast television network in the United States exclusively devoted to Native American and World Indigenous content.

It was another beautiful day in our **KTWU** neighborho





This program helps students master public speaking skills, build self-confidence, and learn about literary history and contemporary life. Students also have the opportunity to compete for an expenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C., and more than \$50,000 in scholarships and prizes.





KTWU won a **Public Media Award** for **"Poetry Out Loud: Kansas Competition 2023"** in the Performing Arts category. **"Portrait of a Landscape: Winds of Renewal"** was nominated in the Visual Arts category.

"Washburn Holiday Vespers", a production of the Washburn University School of Music and **KTWU**, is an holiday masterpiece that features University students and staff. Our station designs and decorates the set, films the performance, then runs it on **KTWU**.

"Capital Holiday" our newest holiday production, features performances by local musicians in various locations throughout the community. Musical acts featured this year were: David Lowry Quartet, Free State Brass Band, Meadowlark Quartet and Topeka Big Band.

In Fall 2022, **KTWU** hosted a **Travel Outing** to New England and Cape Cod to view the Autumn Foliage.









The **KTWU Production Department** resumed giving tours to high school and university mass media students as Covid restrictions were eased.

After a two-year hiatus due to the pandemic, Theatre of the Mind performances resumed with "Sherlock Holmes And The Giant Rat Of Sumatra"

With original scripts written by local playwright Phil Grecian. performed by the talented cast and crew of the Air Command, and produced for television by **KTWU**, we feature a unique fine arts performance not seen anywhere else around the country.

Theater of the Mind is radio you can see. We take the 1940s-style radio plays of yesteryear and make them visual by encompassing actors to voice multiple roles and a sound effects team that uses unique objects and instruments to make the sounds come alive, right in front of your eyes!

"Identity Quest" was filmed during the Topeka and Shawnee County Public Library's two-day cultural event and genealogy conference.

KTWU produced segments featuring eight well-known Kansas personalities who were chosen to provide the opportunity to explore race, ethnicity, gender, sexual preference and socioeconomic status


Genealogical research was conducted on each person with the outcome expected to reveal unique and unknown family history.

KTWU staff donated Christmas gifts and essential items for women and children who were utilizing services of the YWCA Center for Safety and Empowerment. The center provides free and confidential services to victims of domestic and sexual violence, stalking, and human trafficking in Shawnee, Jackson, Brown, and Wabaunsee counties in Kansas.

Each episode takes viewers on a journey to the diverse landscapes of Kansas throughout four seasons.

Kansas...flat and boring??? Not in this series. "Portrait of a Landscape: Seasons" makes Kansas come alive...a visual masterpiece that will take your breath away with the magnificent visuals and original compositions.

Utilizing a variety of production techniques and technologies (including time-lapse and drone, macro and wide lenses), the **"Portrait of a Landscape"** production team logged more than 10,000 miles while gathering footage throughout Kansas for a full year.

We captured beautiful and stunning Kansas displays, including: Monument Rocks; the Arikaree Breaks; Little Jerusalem; the Flint Hills; several Kansas lakes, including Scott Lake and Lake Wilson; Pillsbury Crossing; Maxwell Wildlife Refuge; Cottonwood Falls; the annual Spring burning of the prairie; the Kansas River; the Smoky Hills; the Gypsum Hills; sunflower fields; Rock City; and so much more!

The soundtrack for **"Portrait of a Landscape: Seasons"** features original compositions by U.S. composers, including gifted composer/arranger and violinist/violist Stuart Ross Carlson, and locally raised new-age pianist Daniel Mangiaracino. The collaboration led to the perfect pairing of music and nature.

This series will mesmerize audiences nationwide, creating wonder and curiosity as they view our beautiful state of Kansas in a way they had never before seen. **"Portrait of a Landscape"** features four 30-minute episodes: **"Prairie Winter"**, **"Winds of Renewal"**, **"Amber Waves" and "Flights of Color"**.
